"THIS SIMPLY MEANS THAT NON-VIOLENCE HAS CEASED AS A MEANS OF FIGHTING. THE PEOPLE CANNOT BE TAUGHT TO BE NON-VIOLENT WHILE WE ARE INVOLVED IN A VIOLENT WAR IN VIETNAM. NON-VIOLENCE CANNOT BE PREACHED TO THE BLACK PEOPLE WHO HAVE TO FACE VIOLENCE EVERY DAY ON THE STREETS OF THIS COUNTRY." THIS WAS SAID IN A TELEPHONE CONVERSATION BETWEEN RADIO HABANA AND FLOYD MCKISSICK. 

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RELEASE OF THIS DOCUMENT

The attached sets forth the results of an interview with Edward P. Morgan (former Bureau Inspector) on 3/20/67.

By way of background, during February, 1967, James J. Rowley, U. S. Secret Service, advised that Drew Pearson, contacted Chief Justice Warren concerning information in possession of Edward P. Morgan. The Chief Justice refused to see Morgan; however, it was determined Morgan alleged that former Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy organized a group to go to Cuba to kill Castro. All of this group were killed or imprisoned except one person who escaped, and subsequently, after Castro learning of the plot, decided to utilize the same procedure to kill President Kennedy and that he hired Oswald to do the job. This information allegedly came from a client of Morgan's. Secret Service made an appointment to talk to Morgan; however, he never showed up.

On 3/17/67, Mr. Watson at the White House advised that President Johnson desired the FBI to interview Morgan concerning any knowledge he might have had concerning the assassination of President Kennedy.

Morgan was interviewed on 3/20/67 by Washington Field Office Agents. Due to attorney-client relationship, Morgan would not identify the persons who furnished him information concerning the assassination. He stated his clients, while not directly involved in the assassination, had knowledge of the plot. Morgan alleges his clients were used by a Government Agency (obviously Central Intelligence Agency, CIA) to plot the assassination of Fidel Castro, and that Castro learned of the plot, and thereafter, dispatched teams of assassins to the U. S. for the purpose of assassinating President Kennedy. He said his clients were aware of the identity of some of these individuals, and he understood that two such individuals were in the State of New Jersey.

Morgan also stated that one of the clients he represented was a high type individual of the Catholic faith. When he queried this individual as to why he became involved in such a project as the assassination of Castro, his client indicated the project was so highly patriotically motivated that this overrode personal ethical or moral considerations.

During 1961, we conducted an investigation of a violation of Unauthorized Publication or Use of Communication Statute on the part of Arthur James Balletti, arrested in Las Vegas, Nevada, by local authorities on a wire tapping charge. Our investigation determined this involved Robert A. Maheu,\* private detective, that coverage was instituted in behalf of CIA's efforts to obtain Cuban intelligence data through hoodlum element.

We checked with CIA and learned CIA was-utilizing Maheu as an intermediary with Sam Giancana, relative to CIA's "dirty business" anti-Castro activities. On 5/22/61 we furnished the then Attorney General Kennedy a memorandum containing the rundown of CIA's involvement of this which involved Maheu, who had been hired by CIA to approach Sam Giancana to have Castro assassinated at a cost of \$150,000. On 5/9/62 Kennedy advised he had issued orders that CIA should never undertake such steps again without first checking with the Department of Justice.

This information is briefly set forth in the enclosure as it appears to relate to information in Morgan's possession. Since CIA furnished information on a strictly highly confidential "need-to-know" basis and requested that it be handled on a most restrictive basis, this is being set forth in the communications attached.

ACTION:

Attached for approval is a letter to Mrs. Stegall at the White House, the Attorney General, and James J. Rowley, U. S. Secret Service, enclosing a memorandum setting forth the information furnished by Morgan, and information received from CIA. The enclosures to these communications are classified Top Secret.

The Select Committee on Assassinations of the United States House of Representatives which is investigating the assassinations of President John F. Kennedy and the Reverend Martin Luther King, Jr., has requested Department of Justice files regarding Antulio Ortiz Ramirez.

By way of background, on May 1, 1961, Ramirez hijacked a National Airlines plane over Marathon, Florida, and forced the pilot to fly to Cuba. Subsequently, the plane and its passengers returned to the United States but Ramirez remained in Cuba. On June 28, 1961, a Federal grand jury at Miami, Florida, returned an indictment charging Ramirez with assault, transporting a kidnapped person and transportation of a stolen vehicle, in violation of 18 U.S.C. §§113, 1201, and 2312. Ramirez was apprehended on November 21, 1975, at Miami International Airport upon his arrival from Kingston, Jamaica and admitted guilt regarding the 1961 hijacking. He subsequently pleaded guilty on March 4, 1976, and was sentenced to 20 years for kidnapping.

We are prepared to allow the Select Committee on Assassinations access to departmental files regarding Ramirez and will declassify several classified documents contained therein in order to allow all Committee members access to the requested files. However, the files proposed for release contain a report by Special Agent Theodore N. SUBJECT: Request from Richard Sprague, Counsel

1. At about noon yesterday, Richard Sprague called me to say that the Assassinations Committee has subpoenaed Santos Trafficante and that he (Sprague) would like any information we can provide the Committee regarding Trafficante, including his relationships with Johnny Roselli and Sam Giancana, plus any information we have on his relationships with Cubans or with plots against Castro. I told Sprague I would look into the matter and be back in touch with him.

2. After checking with interested offices in the Agency and with the FBI and the Department of Justice, as well as touching base with Hank Knoche and Commander McMahon, I told Sprague last night that our checks thus far had indicated that any information which we might have within the parameters of his request was classified; that since none of the Committee staff have security clearances and have not signed secrecy agreements as originally anticipated, we were not in a position to grant them access to classified information. Sprague had no quarrel with this as such; however, he cited a previous instance in which Hank Knoche, as Acting Director, made a specific exception to normal security procedures so that Sprague could be given access on a one-time basis to a summary prepared by the Agency concerning telephone intercepts of conversations in Mexico City between Lee Harvey Oswald and the Soviet Embassy there in September/October 1973. This step was taken in an effort to correct erroneous information contained in an article by Norman Kempster pertaining to these intercepts.

3. I learned today that yesterday afternoon, in connection with Freedom of Information requests by Bernard Fensterwald (who is close to the House Select Committee on Assassinations investigation) and others, the Agency released 24 documents pertaining to the Kennedy assassination. These documents dealt principally with the Jim Garrison allegations in 1967 regarding alleged CIA involvement in the Kennedy assassination. I am contacting Sprague to provide him with copies of the documents released yesterday and any others that are publicly released in these or any other FOIA actions relating to the Kennedy assassination issue. While these FOIA requests do not concern Trafficante and are unrelated to Sprague's request as such, they do, of course, relate to the subject of the Kennedy assassination and are evidence of our willingness to provide Sprague with unclassified information of possible interest to the Committee. With your approval, I will again inform Sprague that while we would provide him with any unclassified information we have (in fact records checked thus far are classified), we will not grant authorization for access to any classified information until appropriate security clearances have been obtained for the staff and secrecy agreements have been signed. This is in keeping with the President's concern about the proliferation of sensitive intelligence information. As you know, the potential for press blow back in this whole area is extremely high since the Assassinations Committee is attempting to convince the House of Representatives of the need for investigations of the John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King assassinations. I am keeping Andrew Falkiewicz informed.

4. Our proposal is consistent with the position being taken by Justice and the FBI in connection with similar requests which Sprague has made to them; that is, they are providing him with unclassified information but are not responding to his request for information concerning Trafficante or any other information which is either classified or otherwise considered sensitive.

# CIA Withheld Data on Oswald

## Assassinations Panel Issues Report to House

WASHINGTON—The CIA withheld from the FBI for almost two months in 1963 information that Lee Harvey Oswald had talked with Cuban and Soviet officials about his desire to visit those countries, a House committee reported Friday.

The Select Committee on Assassinations indicated in a report to the full House that its investigation of the murder of President John F. Kennedy would focus early in 1977 on a trip Oswald had made to Mexico City in October, 1963.

CIA Counsel Richard A. Sprague said that the committee staff had learned that a CIA message describing Oswald's activities in Mexico to federal agencies such as the FBI had been rewritten to eliminate any mention of his request for Cuban and Soviet visas. The message was sent in October, more than a month before the Nov. 22, 1963, assassination.

The CIA discovered Oswald's presence at the embassies through its routine surveillance of those facilities. Because Oswald had once defected to the Soviet Union, the CIA and FBI had been interested in his activities even before the Kennedy assassination.

The CIA's decision to withhold information was reversed shortly after Kennedy was killed. The agency reported Oswald's efforts to visit Cuba and the Soviet Union both to the FBI

and to the Warren Commission, which concluded that Oswald was the assassin and had acted alone.

Sprague told a press conference that it was impossible without more information to know why the CIA had censored its own message.

But he said the incident raised two interesting questions: what might the other agencies have done differently if they had been more fully informed and why did the CIA decide to remove "information that was considered pertinent enough to be put in an initial draft of the message?"

There were no firm conclusions in the report, which the 12-member committee prepared after the first three months of its investigation into the murders of Kennedy and civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King.

Technically, the committee goes out of business Tuesday with the end of the session of Congress in which it was formed. The purpose of the year-end report was to urge the new Congress to reestablish the committee and to give it \$6.5 million to pay for the first year of what could be a two-year investigation.

"In the three months since its establishment, the committee has initiated preliminary investigations into new and previously unpursued leads in both assassinations," the report said.

The committee said its staff investigators had recently questioned a former CIA agent who had "personal knowledge" of Oswald's visits to the Soviet and Cuban embassies in Mexico. As a result of that interview, the report said, staff members were sent to Mexico, where they found and questioned additional witnesses.

"These witnesses had never been sought out before by any investigative body, notwithstanding the fact that they had important information concerning statements by Lee Harvey Oswald in Mexico within 60 days of the assassination of President Kennedy," the report said.

The report said also that the committee staff had interviewed a person who asserted that he had discussed the King murder with James Earl Ray, who pleaded guilty to the crime. The unidentified witness said that Ray had told him about contacting an associate in Europe to receive further instructions. The story, which was told to reporters by a committee member several weeks ago, has not been verified.

In a letter to New York Times columnist Anthony Lewis, Ray offered this week to testify under oath at a committee hearing. But Sprague and Walter F. Fauntroy, the

District of Columbia's congressional delegate and the chairman of the King subcommittee said that no decision had been made on accepting Ray's offer.

However, Sprague indicated that it probably would be accepted.

"Any and all people who have relevant information will be interrogated," Sprague said.

In a personal statement issued in conjunction with the report, Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez (D-Tex.), who is to become committee chairman in the new year, said a thorough investigation was needed to answer hundreds of pressing questions.

Gonzalez said that the committee hoped to discover whether former FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover's now well-known animosity toward King had affected the FBI's investigation of the assassination.

However, Gonzalez said, the committee's work could go well beyond the killings of Kennedy and King.

"The committee can shed light on the larger issue of political murder and violence," Gonzalez said. "We should not forget that President Ford had his own narrow escapes; no member of the House should forget that the Capitol Building was bombed."

He said the committee's ultimate task was "to find out not just what happened but why."

1. The undersigned takes umbrage at the continual irresponsibility of the American press in its reporting on Lee Harvey Oswald and the Agency's alleged mishandling of the case. It is particularly galling when the Chief Counsel, Richard A. Sprague, of the House Select Committee on Assassinations, releases to the press statements which, as cited by Norman Kempster, are both inaccurate and detrimental to the Agency and which the Agency has not been given the opportunity to refute.

2. It is evident from such releases that the Agency is once again to be laid open to public scrutiny by a hostile press aided and abetted by an unsympathetic Congressional Committee. In other words, the Agency has been already charged and will be tried and sentenced without being allowed the basic rights of any defendant before a court of law, although any argument presented by the Agency in its own defense would probably be rejected out of hand.

3. The inference of Sprague's public statements (as cited by Kempster) pertaining to the Agency's alleged mishandling of the Oswald case is that the Agency was dishonest; that it deliberately withheld pertinent information from the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Warren Commission. Sprague's judgement (based upon incomplete investigation) does not coincide with the impression he left with Agency representatives during his first visit here on 24 November 1976 "that he will not prejudge (emphasis added) the Agency

1. In order to contribute to the effort being made to locate and apprehend subject, who reportedly shot and killed MARTIN LUTHER KING, Headquarters checked its records for information on the subject. This check was unproductive.
2. We also checked travel listings of US citizens who travelled to Cuba, as well as the LIONION production for the months of October and November 1967, on the off chance that subject may have visited the target, since he allegedly was in Mexico during this period. This effort likewise met with negative results.
3. The above is furnished merely for the Station's information.
